CORONAVIRUS HELP

During the latest national lockdown, Standish Coronavirus Help (SCH) is continuing to support self-isolating vulnerable people in our village who need shopping and other errands being done for them.

The number of people requiring our help has reduced since the first lockdown but as part of our scheme we were able to give Christmas treats to the 60 or so people who were on our support list.

SCH was set up by Standish Voice and the village's three councillors, Adam Marsh, Debbie Parkinson and Ray Whittingham, with the help of more than 100 volunteers, and we raised money in a COVID crowdfunding campaign.

Using some of this money, in early December we were able to deliver poinsettia flowers sourced by Standish florist, Wild Flowers, to the people we have looked after.

They were delivered by local 14-year-old Louis Martland as part of his Duke of Edinburgh Award, and his mum, Jo – complete with festive outfits!

SCH also arranged for a full Christmas dinner to be paid for and delivered to

those we have helped in the week before Christmas itself, after teaming up with the Hinds Head pub, which has undertaken a series of charitable initiatives during the pandemic.

SCH will continue through the pandemic until people do not need our help any more.

Thanks to everyone involved, including Standish company SMARTstrat, which continues to staff our helpline.

REGIONAL PLAN WILL BE REWORKED... AGAIN

The masterplan for Greater Manchester – which would protect Standish's Green Belt for another 16 years – will have to be reworked.

Stockport rejected the Greater Manchester Spatial Framework, which was due to be open for consultation last month in its final leg before implementation.

The Framework decides on development across GM, including Standish, until 2037 and it will now be delayed after it has to be redrawn to include only nine councils.

The plan protected Standish's Green Belt against development, including house building.

Standish Voice has been lobbying to prevent any of our Green Belt from being changed into areas where development can happen as there has already been too much housebuilding, too quickly, in Standish over the past few years.

We will continue to monitor the progress of the plan and report back to you when there is more information.
